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Handbook and Calendar 2018

In preparation for next year's handbook and calendar, the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Prem Misir, held several sessions with the staff at Saweni campus last month.

Discussions were on inclusion of new regulations; including the postgraduate regulations. The University of Fiji is on the threshold of an academic take-off vis-à-vis the Strategic Plan's knowledge-based development framework, powering the mainstream curriculum and co-curricular activities in conjunction with a variety of modes of delivery.

The Vice-Chancellor's message to the staff on the 2018 Calendar and handbooks is as follows:

"Drawing from Crow and Dabars' recent work, Designing the New American University (Johns Hopkins University Press, 2015) and introducing some important qualifications for national contextual purposes, this imminent academic take-off intends to use a pro-active focus to achieve: (1) a persisting academic platform for the production of new knowledge and innovation through a penetrative connectivity with pedagogy and research; (2) a deepening accessibility to students from diversified demographic and socio-economic backgrounds; and (3) an institutional commitment to reach maximum societal impact consistent with the size of enrolment demand and national needs."

The focus on (1) through (3) not only may generate new knowledge and innovation, but also work-readiness students.

As a precursor to familiarize them with the global village phenomenon and its implications that may impact a rapidly changing world of work within an evolutionary knowledge society in Fiji, students could become master-learners, inclusive of full exposure to interdisciplinary modes of learning and teaching. A major requirement to realize these foci (1) through (3) is the institution of a solid and enduring regulations framework at this University.

The University of Fiji's regulations within its Handbook/Calendar, among other things, may reinforce public accountability for Government Subventions/other Government's funds, uphold students' interests, and preserve the integrity of this University.

The notion that any senior management and advisory group at any university can secure approvals for some of its policy decisions from the Senate and the Council, may induce a latent complacency to encourage limited engagement in wider consultations across the university spectrum on significant matters, endearing to all staff.

Meaningful university democracy and not exclusion make for good governance. Protecting the human rights of all students and all staff, and perhaps, other active stakeholders, and institutionalizing a healthy democracy are critical to sustain a robust stability of this University's structure and functioning with roots in international best practices.

As a starting point, the Handbook/Calendar becomes a critical tool to achieve good governance and persisting stability at this University.

And so, it is vital to attract inputs from all staff in the current 'regulations' consultation process on the 2018 Handbook/Calendar, to correct deficiencies and implement a fresh outlook on the University's modus operandi.

The Vice-Chancellor's Public Lectures

Associate Professor, Umesh Sharma, from the Department of Accounting at the University of Waikato, Hamilton, New Zealand conducted the Vice-Chancellor's public lecture on Friday, August 25, 2017.

Dr. Sharma spoke on his research paper "The changes and challenges for indigenous owned businesses: A Pacific Islands case study". He explained the many differences between the operations of Chinese businesses and indigenous owned businesses in Tonga.

His findings showed that many indigenous owned businesses in Tonga did not follow proper accounting procedures including the separate entity principle which treated business entities as separate from their owners and that 52 percent of the research participants felt that culture and religious beliefs were the biggest challenges faced by the indigenous businesses.

"Two thirds of the indigenous people said that fulfillment of social obligatory functions were the key reason for having businesses and not for profit-making purpose, while 100 percent of the Chinese businesses believed that the sole purpose of running a business was to make profits," he said.

The Vice-Chancellor, Professor Misir said that the research is a setting stage for some very multi and interdisciplinary research as well as some game changing situations vis-a-vis the western world.

The Vice-Chancellor Public lectures are held every month on various topics.

Students were advised on the University's course offerings, fees structures as well as why UniFiji would be a suitable choice for them. The Principals and the community welcomed the UniFiji outreach programme and hoped that the university would bring its teaching services right to the North in future.

With increased and improved teaching and learning resources, The University of Fiji has the capability to recruit more students at both campuses. The Suva campus which became a fully-fledged campus from this year now has two newly built lecture theaters with a seating capacity of 250.

Ms Prasad said that she was extremely grateful to the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Prem Misir for approving this excursion.

"I hail from Labasa and always wished I could give back something to the community. What's more valuable than guiding them to get good education? During my high school days, we hardly had any universities coming to inform us about their programmes and various career paths that followed as an outcome of the subject we did in high school. I saw this opportunity to create an outreach programme for the Year 13 students," Ms. Prasad stated.

The team also held a road show to further reach prospective students in the Northern Division. Over 300 students have filled in application forms and many others have showed interest in choosing UniFiji as their University.

The University has plans for more visits to schools in the near future.

cant, perceptible, and quick degradation in water quality, biodiversity, and various other critical parameters as a direct result of climate change.

Developing this human and technical capability is an important contribution to the Marine Biodiversity Observation Network (MBON) of the Group on Earth Observation.

With a grant from USAID's, Pacific American Climate Fund (PACAM) at The University of Fiji embarked on a research to explore the utility of satellite imagery to identify and classify coral reefs, marine benthic habitats and seagrass at two coastal communities in Fiji: Votua, Ba, where corals have experienced reduced growth rates, higher mortality due to bleaching, and increased damage by severe weather; and at Komave, Coral Coast which has healthier fringing reefs attributed to conservation practices.

Coastal areas world-wide are suffering signifi- The project is in its final year and has been able to attain many of its goals including building local capacity to derive land and submerged habitat classification maps, including processing of large volumes of regional satellite imagery of island territories; developing a robust data processing system to produce high resolution thematic maps that illustrate the human uses and characteristics of global coastal ecosystems, including coral reefs, wetlands and coastal aquaculture system and many more.

> However, in its final year, the project aims to develop a user-friendly interface, so that stakeholders can easily access information regarding marine reserves, ecotourism and sustainable management of marine resources and improve existing curses or develop new courses at The University of Fiji.

In an effort to encourage and maintain a litter free and healthier Ba River, UniFiji students and staff from Department of Science, School of Science and Technology (SoST) participated in a 'Clean Up' campaign along a certain section of the Ba Riverbank on Friday, August 25, 2017.

The 'Clean Up' campaign which was organized by non-governmental organization, the World Wide Fund for Nature - Pacific, comes under WWF-Pacific's Pacific American Climate Fund (PACAM) climate change project of 'Strengthening Governance and Building Resiliency of Communities in Fiji' that is funded by USAID. The campaign is also in line with the PACAM projects 'Sustainable Healthy Rivers for All' campaign that looks at promoting effective sustainable management practices along the rivers of

Over the past few months, WWF-Pacific has been working with communities in Nailaga district to advocate for a healthier and cleaner Ba River. The Ba River, which is 83 km long, is home to 36 communities that live along the river, 17 of which solely rely on the Ba River for their daily survival. The nine Ba Riverside carnival contestants, Ba Town Council staff, Nailaga district communities and various government entities were also part of the 2 hour 'Clean Up' campaign. More than 200 kilograms of rubbish was collected and sorted.

Ms. Priyatma Singh, of UniFiji's School of Science and Technology, highlighted that the science students and staff were happy to participate in the clean-up as the initiative is in support of Fiji's presidency for COP 23 and environmental awareness. WWF-Pacific's PACAM project manager, Mr. Vinesh Kumar, highlighted that the need for a healthier and cleaner Ba River is critical for the livelihoods of the communities in Ba.

"This 'Clean Up' campaign will go a long way in not only reducing the disposal of rubbish along the Bariverbank but promote civil pride and the notion of making an effective change for the environment," said Mr. Kumar.

WWF-Pacific and stakeholders plan to hold more clean up campaigns over the next few months.

The degree aims to support serving teachers and educators seeking to achieve Masters level accreditation for the highest standards of critique and application of theories of educational leadership to practice.

The Master of Educational Leadership offers the opportunity for in-depth study of research relevant to educational leadership and the chance to critique and contribute to the educational research that is shaping Fiji's educational policy and practice. It provides practicing teachers with the theoretical understandings and practical skills needed to make a difference to the quality of education in their current and future workplaces.

The programme is offered at the Labasa Centre as well as Suva and Saweni campuses. Speaking about the programme, Dean of the School of Humanities and Arts (SoHA), Associate Professor, Dr. Wahab Ali said that the programme is exceptional for those who intend to build up their knowledge and skills for being a good leader.

"Our programme is excellent because having the promotion and becoming a Principal is not all; one needs to have those qualities of a good leader. The programme changes the leadership style in the professional and personal lives," he said.

Dr. Ali further elaborated that Master of Educational Leadership programme expands the knowledge and professional skills of experienced educators and leaders, by ensuring effective, enlightened and accountable leadership in Fiji.

First of its kind in Fiji!

The Master's in Renewable Energy Management (MREM) programme commenced at The University of Fiji on February 13, 2017 with an initial enrolment of 12 students.

Interest in Renewable Energy has come from diverse areas of the economy, including the teaching, research and the industrial sectors. Those registered for the programme include practicing scientists, engineers and power generation project managers in addition to teachers and young University staff. The programme is now in the second semester.

Students are actively involved in research work as part of their course assessment. In addition to the current research being carried out by students under the Centre of Renewable Energy (CORE) other areas of interest include Butoni wind farm, prospects of biodiesel production in Fiji and prospects of bioethanol production for which talks are currently underway for a possible research collaboration with the Fiji Sugar Corporation (FSC).

The first two courses offered in Semester 1, 2017 were coordinated by Associate Professor Anirudh Singh and included REM400: Renewable Energy Technology I (Biomass) and REM401: Renewable Energy Technology II (Wind Energy & Solar PV). Students in semester 2 are enrolled in REM402: Renewable Energy and Sustainable Development and REM403: Energy Economics and Management (Coordinated by Dr. Ranasinghe Amaradasa).

The REM programme has also welcomed on board the Energy Policy expert - Dr. Evanthie Michalena who has been conducting some lectures on Renewable Energy and Sustainable Development.

Sai Medical Conference

The University of Fiji's Umanand Prasad School of Medicine and Health Sciences (UPSM & HS) hosted its bi-annual Sai Conference with the Sai Group from Australia.

The conference highlighted the aspect of pain management as well as contributing four points to the continued professional points.

She presented on Ecosystem Based Adaptation to Climate Change.

Speaking at the session, she said that the impact of climate change exacerbates the natural processes of coastal and riverbank erosion by increasing the frequency of rainfall resulting in flooding and increased sea levels.

"As a conservation organization, WWF looks to promote the use of soft measures that are innovative, cost effective, and readily available in the community. WWF will be introducing the fairly new idea of using coir logs which is made out of biodegradable and readily available coconut fiber," said Dr. Savou.

Her presentation was in line with her research in areas of costal management, protection and tsunami, river morphology, marine ecosystems, climate change and resilience on rivers and coastlines.

UniFiji Students Join Namatakula Youths for the Green Village Declaration

Seventeen (17) students from the Centre for iTaukei Studies (CIS) at The University of Fiji joined youths from Namatakula Village, Coral Coast to declare the village a Green Village on Friday, August 25, 2017.

The University of Fiji had used Komave village and the Vusu tribe (Namatakula) "iqoliqoli" as one of the two selected sites in Fiji for their Pacific American Climate Fund (PACAM) Project in 2016.

The mapping study identified some important findings relating to depletion of corals reefs and washing away of foreshores which can have a direct effect on the marine habitat as well the presence of all forms of wastes along the foreshores.

The Namatakula Village Youths saw this as alarming for future generations food source and natural environment.

The clean up event involved replanting of indigenous plants at the beach, rubbish collection around the village and community awareness on environmental concerns.

Like the University of Fiji, the Namatakula community fully supports the government drive of COP23 as being the first village in the Western division.

Associate Professor and Director of CIS, Dr. Litiana Kuridrani, said that the campaign helped the iTaukei students to integrate indigenous knowledge and traditional coping mechanisms of climate change adaptation by means of replanting, documentation of preservation and conservation methods in the iTaukei context.

"The iTaukei studies students recognize the benefits of maintaining the Green Village initiative and are living vessels to impart change in their own communities. Change begins within you and we have to start small somewhere," said Associate Professor Dr. Kuridrani.

School of Law Holds Seminar on RAMSI

Brief Background of RAMSI

RAMSI, or Regional Assistance Mission to Solomon Islands, is the peace mission which was despatched by the 16-member Pacific Islands Forum in response to a call for help from the State of Solomon Islands for assistance in the restoration of peace and order in that country following the outbreak of inter-tribal violence by armed civilian groups during period 1998 to 2003. Unable to control law and order, the Solomon Islands sought help from the Pacific Islands Forum.

RAMSI was the regional response. Led by Australia, RAMSI served in the Solomon Islands from 2003 to 2017. RAMSI was made up of police and military contingents from the member countries of the Pacific Islands Forum, including Fiji. Australia was the largest contributor; both in personnel and budget support, and provided the command leadership of RAMSI throughout its deployment in the Solomon Islands.

The University of Fiji's, School of Law (SoL) held a public seminar titled "RAMSI - Success or Failure" at the Reserve Bank of Fiji, on Thursday, August 23, 2017.

The speakers at the seminar were Mr. Mataiasi Lomaloma, who served as RAMSI's Assistant Resident Co-ordinator from 2006-2017, and Mr. Sakiusa Rabuka, who served as the Pacific Islands Forum Secretariat resident representative to the Solomon Islands from 2009 to 2017.

Given their first-hand knowledge of the work and operation of RAMSI, the SoL was fortunate to receive their consent to be the main speakers at the seminar, to share with the audience their assessment of the success or failure of RAMSI in achieving its mandate. The speakers highlighted that RAMSI was a great success as it stopped all violence, restored peace and order, strengthened the Police Force, rebuilt the economy, and improved standards of good governance in the Public Service

"However, RAMSI's mandate, unfortunately, did not extend into the broader area of nation building. This was to be left to the national political leadership in the Solomon Islands, both in Government and in Parliament. And it is here that one can see the deep-seated, complex and intractable nature of both State building and national unity building. Corruption is rife in the political leadership of the country," they stated. They further said that the evidence of this can to be found in the Government borrowing US\$25 million from the Taiwan EXIM Bank to be spent in compensating Ministers, senior civil servants, clients among the different factions engaged in violent conflict.

"Such funds could have been better spent on public development projects to create jobs and livelihood for the thousands of young people who in absence of opportunities were compelled to resort to violence, So, it was clear from all this very sad situation in the Solomon Islands, that in any country, including Fiji, the most important ingredient for successful State building and achieving national unity is national political leadership that is honest and com-

mitted to serving the needs of the country and all its people."

The central issue of interest of the seminar was what Fiji could learn from what happened in the Solomon Islands on the essential ingredients of good national leadership to be successful in governing the State, including the effective maintenance of peace, order and security, laying the basis of a sustainable economy, ensuring accountability and transparency in government operations, and providing for the basic needs of the population.

Mr. Sitiveni Rabuka, who served as Prime Minister of Fiji from 1992 to 1999, one of the attendees of the seminar expresses that this was the kind of public discussions on the problems and challenges of national political leadership that should be very useful for Fiji's own cadre of new political leaders—to educate them and to broaden their minds on what is, and what is not, good, responsible and accountable public leadership.


"Unless our politicians broaden their minds, they can easily succumb to the politics of parochialism, clientelism and ethnic extremism, which clearly are crux of the problems in the Solomon Islands," he added.

SoL students as well as the members of the general public attended the seminar. The School of Law will continue to hold public seminars of this nature in future when an opportunity arises, for the benefit of both its students and the general public.
